Priority 1 A. provides an immediate return on the investment that reduces the potential harm to the public and our officers, ensures compliance with evolving federal/state law and community expectations.

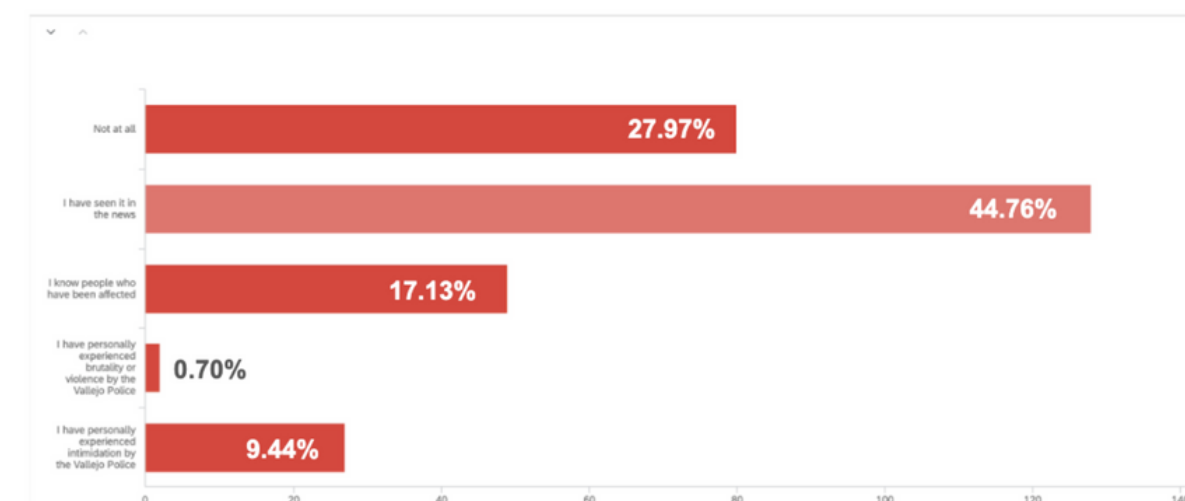

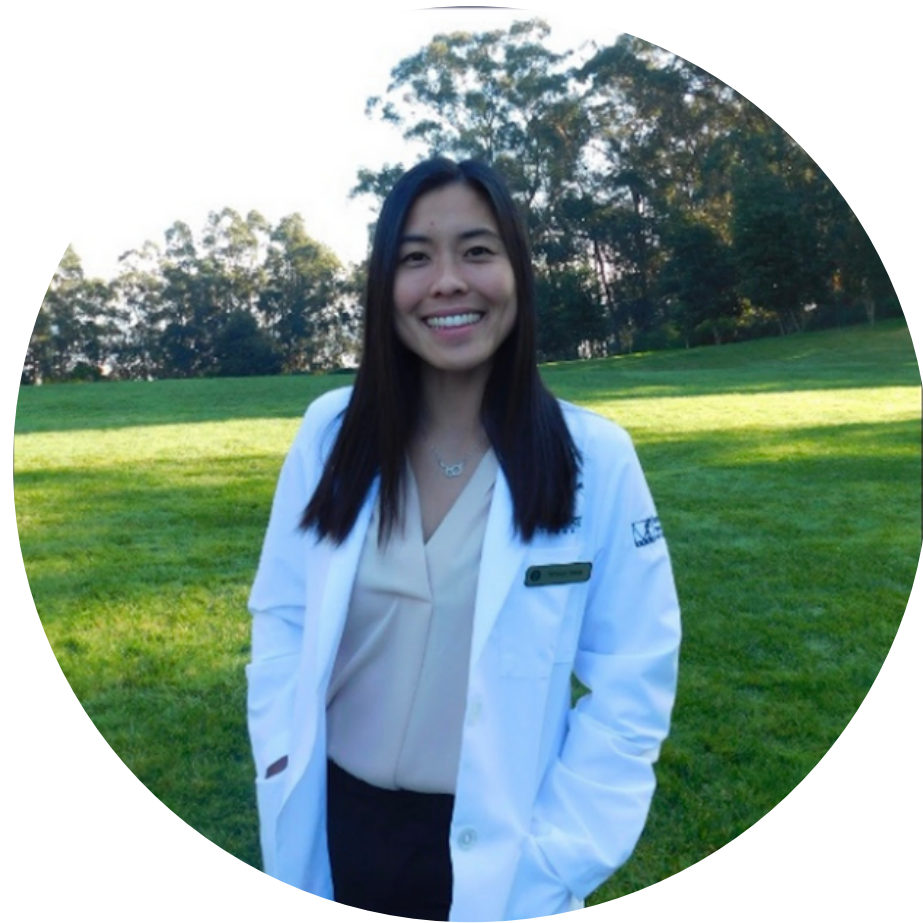
